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Dear Parent

The Easter Term is usually our shortest, yet in many ways the busiest. Year 9 have been working hard and preparing for their SATs while anyone with a son or daughter in Year 11 will know the pressures generated by trying to complete coursework deadlines set by the examination boards. Hopefully the important work needed for success has taken place and after Easter we can concentrate on exam preparation and revision.

This term has seen a strengthening of the citation system. It is now better coordinated and in some ways a little tougher. I believe that good discipline is the bedrock of positive relationships between staff and students. Our rules are simple and fair, allowing a community of nearly 1,100 people to live harmoniously. Respect is the key feature of our system thereby demonstrating that when it is earned and given it creates positive and purposeful relationships. In many ways we have gone straight back to the basics and have concentrated on students bringing the right equipment and their diaries to their lessons.

This term has also seen us look carefully at our attendance figures. They are good but, as always, could be improved. Over the last couple of years we have been required to set targets for our attendance. For the first time I have included this information in the newsletter. At 94% this is a good target yet one of our main problems with absence relates to parents who take their children out of school to go on holiday in term time. The school is looking at ways to reduce this figure and work with

parents to eliminate it completely. I now feel that this is becoming a serious problem for the school and will be in contact with parents regarding our proposals in the summer term. In the meantime, can I ask that parents think carefully before taking their child out of school for any reason but especially for family holidays in term time.

Finally, can I thank you for your help and support throughout the term. It is evident from the parent questionnaires issued at Parents Evenings that you support the school in all key aspects of our work. I would, however, like to reassure you that we collate and analyse your evaluations. After the Year 8 Parents' Evening questionnaires were analysed, we asked a group of parents to come in and talk through some of the issues raised. We will also do the same with a random selection of Year 11 parents. These important views not only help improve what we do but also shape the new Strategic Plan for 2007-08. I will give you a fuller breakdown in the next newsletter.

Can I wish you and your family a happy Easter. School closes at 3.15 pm on Friday 30th March and re-opens at 8.45 am on Monday 16th April.

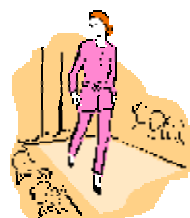
Magenta...

Over the last few weeks we have been producing an enterprise poster for Mr Williams and Mrs Moorhouse. This poster intends to show people how to be enterprising.

As we were making it we had to overcome many obstacles, some of these problems were minor and some major.

We had a specification for the poster to ensure it was of the highest quality. Other problems involved changing the DPI (Dots Per Inch). This is where the quality of the picture decreases when blown up, and this proved to be quite difficult but in the end we changed it to the specification of 300 DPI. As well as the DPI problem we had to overcome the problem of where to make the poster. We started off making it in word but then had to change to Publisher. This worked well until the DPI problem came along.

Mr Williams phoned the printing business who advised us to make the poster in Adobe photo shop. This didn't work any better than it did in Publisher so we went back to think of a solution. This is when we fixed the problem as we just needed to move some pictures and the text around to spread it out more. When we finished this Mrs Moorhouse phoned the printing company who said that they would get back in touch with her if there was any problem. Fortunately there wasn't any and Mrs Moorhouse was able to retrieve an A3 copy. Whilst making the poster we learnt about how to overcome different problems and had a taste of how to be enterprising. Copies of all the posters will appear in every classroom, so that pupils and staff can see what being enterprising means.

Business Enterprise Day at Langdale

It all began when Stef was asked who she would like to take with her to Langdale to participate in an activity to do with business enterprise with the Year 6 children. With the option given to her she chose me, Jordan Edwards and Alex Shuttler to go with her on Thursday 8th of March to Langdale to help with the running of the activity. The Business Enterprise activity that we would be doing was then explained to us and we agreed it would be fun and we were happy to help.

We arrived at Langdale just before the children's lunch time break had finished which gave us enough time to set up the activity in the hall. Once everything was prepared the children came in and sat themselves on eight tables in groups of roughly ten and waited for instructions. Our group of four split into two's and we each had a side of the hall. We played the roles of banker where the children came to us to buy and sell things. Mr Williams then gave a short speech telling the children all about business enterprise, the activity rules and how it was connected to business.

The aim of the activity was to make as much money as possible by selling pieces of pretend fruit by using the materials given to them. Each table was given a country name, a template of fruit, fifty pounds play money and a trader badge. On the over head projector there was a list of how much each piece of fruit was worth if produced at a good enough quality. The children then decided within their group who would be the trader who would have to go and trade with the bank. Once this was decided the activity began and the children were given fifty-five minutes. The

traders from each table then used their group's money to buy materials from the bank such as: scissors, pieces of

paper, different coloured crayons, sharpeners and other fruit templates. The templates were then drawn around and copied with the design to create similar looking pieces of fruit. They then came to the bank and we decided if the fruit looked enough like the templates to decide how much we were going to give them where they then had the choice of putting the money in the bank at an interest rate of 10% or keeping it on their tables.

The children were then creating many different pieces of fruit and selling them back to the bank trying to get the best price possible even if that meant doing a little haggling (which they weren't afraid to do) and also making use of the 10% interest by putting most of their money in the bank. Once the children had got used to the activity Mr Williams then changed the rules to make it more interesting putting the children in different situations where they could not use their scissors or their crayons at one point, changing the price of how much they could sell the fruit back for, closing the bank and increasing the interest rate. This tested the children as they had to adapt to the new changes but still keep producing the fruit.

Once the game had finished the children went to play and we cleared everything away and added up the totals. When they came back Mr Williams questioned them on the afternoon asking them what they had enjoyed and how they made best possible use of the materials. They said that they had enjoyed it greatly and that the activity had made them work as a team competitively and made them think about what they were doing with the roles they had within their team to make sure they made the most money. Steph and I then thanked the children and said well done to them for their achievements. The top four teams were then announced with team Bermuda coming first winning certificates which were then handed out. Mr Williams then said a few words thanking everybody for the day and what a success it had been and how he hoped that the children had learnt something useful about business.

On the way back to school we spoke about the afternoon. We all agreed that we'd learnt a lot. We'd enjoyed it a great deal and Stef concluded by saying that it was 'different from what she had expected but it was a fun new experience'. All in all we had a great day and would like to thank Mr Williams for organising it and the staff at Langdale for having us as we really enjoyed ourselves and would love to do it again.

Team Mathematics Challenge 2007 Regional Finals 5 March 2007

The day started with the four of us, me, Alex, Tom and John meeting Mrs Peirson at Stoke Station at 8.50 prompt. We had been selected to represent Clayton Hall in the Regional Finals at Manchester University. I think we all felt a little nervous, knowing we would be facing stiff opposition from many other schools, throughout the North West.

We arrived on time, with only a slight diversion and entered the hall to find it full, with over 20 other schools. We felt a little taken aback because some of the other schools looked very professional in their blazers but I reassured my team mates that we were going to win.

We took part in various mathematical challenges, including number sequences, general mathematics questions and crosswords. On the general questions we did o.k. and with a little help from a couple of flukes we got 9/10 correct.

Next was the number crossword. We had to split into pairs (one pair did down and the other, across) and answer a series of questions; the answers to one pair's questions were linked to an answer of the other pair's question. This may sound complicated but we found this challenge quite easy and successfully completed the puzzle with only two incorrect digits which gave us a score of a whopping 58/60!

After that brilliant result we had lunch break. While we ate our sandwiches, the teachers tucked into chocolate muffins and cake, NOT FAIR!!

Then we had to do the number sequences. We had to work out what the next number was in the sequence, we struggled to pick up the patterns on some of them, but on others we managed to get the answers pretty quickly.

Last of all was the dreaded relay. We had to run up to the teacher that we had been working with (from another school) and collect a question which was called A1. One pair (incidentally called the 'A' pair) had to answer the question and within two attempts try to get it right. Then one person ran up and gave the answer to the teacher and collected another question called B1. That person had to run to the other pair and give it to them to work out, while he returned to his seat. When the 'B' pair had completed the question one of their team members had to run up and give it to the teacher to trade for an A question, in this case A2,

The A pair answer the question and the cycle starts all over again. This continued until the time limit of 45 minutes ran out.

Once we had completed all four challenges we had a nervous wait while they totalled up the final scores. After being in the top 5 for all of the challenges we knew we had a chance. That was when they read out the top three spots. When they read out third, it wasn't us. Second were last year's winners from a girl's grammar school. Then the moment of truth arrived... They began to read out first position. We all had our hearts in our mouths when they read out the name. CLAYTON HALL BUSINESS AND LANGUAGE COLLEGE! All of the team were ecstatic and we ran up to the front of the hall to collect our T-shirts. We won!!!!!!!

On the way home we were celebrating; unfortunately we were in the quiet zone on the train and couldn't cheer! When we arrived back at Stoke-on-Trent station our parents picked us up and congratulated the team on its achievement.

The competition lived up to our expectations and we now get to go to the National Finals in London, where over 50 teams will be competing. Looks like we are going to have to win that as well!!!

Connexions News

Part of my role as a Connexions Personal Adviser working in schools is to follow up the previous year's school leavers to find out what they are doing in terms of education, work or training by the end of the October after they have left school.

Last year's destination survey gave the following information about last year's school leavers at Clayton:

78% continued in full-time education as opposed to 76% for all schools in the Newcastle district 17% went into work-based training (including employed and non-employed status apprenticeships) as opposed to 15% for all schools in the Newcastle district 3% were not yet settled as opposed to 7% for all schools in the Newcastle district 2% went into jobs with no training which is the same as for all schools in the Newcastle district.

As you can see, the vast majority (95%) of Clayton school leavers continued into some kind of learning post-16. This is good news, indicating that young people at Clayton are willing to gain further qualifications once they have left school, thus giving them a head start in the jobs market.
