Dear Parent/Carer

As you will know by now the school had an OFSTED inspection on March 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup>. The report produced was very disappointing for all of us at school and it made judgments about our work that felt very harsh and uncompromising. However the two key issues both relate to the way we deliver lessons and to the way departments manage the curriculum. In each case the school believes that further attention in these areas cannot harm and only strengthen the school. We have listened to what they have said and are keen to develop new ways of working. If in doing and delivering an action plan that focuses on teaching and the quality of what we deliver improves this, the school will move forward. Regrettably many of the new strategies adopted by the school since September, failed to receive some recognition in the report. However each one has significantly imparted on the progress of students, especially at Key Stage 4. The school has never been complacent. The governors have fully embraced what we need to do and you as parents can rest assured that we will do everything we can, to improve all areas of our work.

The Spring Term as always is remarkably busy. Year 11 are completing coursework and preparing themselves for their exams. This year for the first time all year 11 were entered for GCSE Maths. The results were very promising with 58% already gaining A\*-C in this subject. Year 11 also took module tests in ICT, Applied Business and Science, again with positive outcomes. We are trying to keep year 11 parents much better informed about what we are doing in school and how they can help their son or daughter. Hopefully this improved communication will add increased support when these young people need it most. All the signs therefore, point to Clayton recovering from a disappointing year last year and we have high hopes for our current year 11.

Throughout the term we have encouraged the College Councils to engage with us and to discuss how we can improve provision. Our major project these coming months, will be to refurbish the kitchen and dining areas. Many parents I know have already mentioned this in their questionnaire feedback. Plans are in place to spend in excess of £100.000 on improving and extending these facilities and all should return to a newly refurbished facility for the school.

Can I wish you all a very Happy Easter and we, as a school, look forward to working with you in the Summer Term which begins on Monday 19<sup>th</sup> April 2010.

**STEM Day**

Following the STEM day on November 27<sup>th</sup> 2009, some year nine pupils got the chance to go on a free Get Ahead with STEM engineering course, to learn more about engineering as a career and get more engineering experience. The seven of us; Megan Beech, Natalie Gilligan, Amy Cooper, James Bridgett, Jack Hughes, Jasmine Yearsley and Louise Clarke travelled to Harper Adams University College in Shropshire on January 5<sup>th</sup> 2010. When we arrived, we were shown our rooms (very nice) and then gathered in the lecture theatre for an introduction. Firstly we had to make a rocket out of paper and sticky tape, and then a car powered by a balloon; based on the Bloodhound Super Sonic Car. After lunch (also very nice) we got into teams with people from other schools and had to make a tower, and a shelter to house two people out of paper tubes and nuts and bolts. That evening we watched Ice Age 3 and had a snowball fight! The next day, we started our main project, working with companies from the engineering world. Teams working with First Group had to make a functional train, teams working with Arup had to make a bridge and teams working with the Royal Navy had to build a warship. We had to design our projects thoroughly and meet all the requirements; like having a radar tower and helipad on the warships, and making the train be able to stop at a station. Then we started

making; cutting, filing, gluing, wiring, and solving problems and fixing it all together, with a limited amount of materials, like wood, foam, motors and paper. We were all making friends and having fun and that evening we went bowling. On Thursday we carried on building, and putting together presentations and display boards about our projects. That evening we had a formal dinner and disco. On the final day we tested our projects and presented to other groups, then prizes were given out. We then said our goodbyes. We all really, really enjoyed it and would recommend it to anyone who gets the chance to go on this fantastic course.

**Message from the Mentoring Team**

A Mentor is an independent person other than a parent who works with individual students offering support, guidance and ideas to help students raise their aspirations, believe in their own ability and reach their full potential.

The Mentoring Team here at Clayton comprises of three staff. Our remit is to work with students who have been identified as in need of extra support in school to help them see and reach their full potential during their school life. This can vary from academic support, pastoral support, behavioural support or simply that a student just needs someone to talk to in confidence. Students from across all year groups can access the service we provide. We have regular meetings with Miss Jones (Assistant Head) where we keep track of individual students being mentored.

Confidentiality is a vital part of our work, with students understanding that what they discuss with us is confidential unless we have any concern for their safety or the safety of others, at which point we would need to share that information appropriately.

We are currently working closely with the teaching staff and with identified students

from Year 11 as they approach their GCSE's. We are offering support in planning revision strategies, time management, motivational support and any other specific difficulties identified by the students or their teachers.

We plan to develop this service over the coming year and will let you know via this newsletter what we are doing.

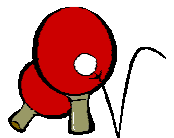

## WHAT WE DID ON THE YR8 MCDONALD TRIP

On Monday 15<sup>th</sup> March 2010 some of the year 8 pupils got offered the opportunity to have a tour of one of the McDonalds facilities in Wolstanton where the manager of the particular McDonalds would give a talk about business and marketing.

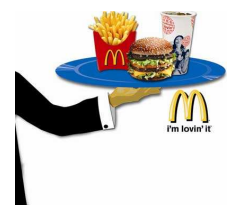
First thing in the morning we all went to room 5 to register and were then told which mini bus we would be on to travel to McDonalds. We arrived at McDonalds

about 10 minutes later. We all then went and sat down ready for the Manager to talk to us. The Manager told us about different types of marketing, direct and indirect. For example a television advert would be direct marketing to the customer as it is clearly marketing McDonalds but the decor of McDonalds itself would be in-direct marketing as it is has lots of McDonalds signs on the walls but is not usually recognised as marketing.

After this we had breakfast; the options were a sausage and egg McMuffin or a bacon and egg McMuffin, with either diet Coke, Fanta or Orange juice to drink. After breakfast a lady showed us all the staff uniforms and certain individuals even got to try them on. There was the apron, hat and hair net which is worn in the kitchen; The reflective jacket which is worn when staff have to take orders outside to the waiting customers and finally the thick plastic apron, gloves and face mask which is worn when staff bring in the boiling fat. The group was then split in half. Half went on a tour of the kitchens and freezers and the other half went to a room with a computer which informed us about all the food served at McDonalds. Finally the groups swapped over before going back to school in the mini buses.

When we arrived back at school we were told that we had to create a short advert advertising McDonalds. We had to split into four groups: musical crew, technical crew, acting crew and the editing crew. Before lunch the musical crew were told that they had to create a jingle to go with the advert. The acting crew were told they had to create a script for the advert and act it out while the technical crew filmed it. Meanwhile, myself and the rest of the editing crew were told that while all the other groups worked on their allocated jobs we had to get used to the software that we would be using.

After lunch we were given, all the other groups work and had the task of putting it all together to make the advert. Ten



minutes into setting up the program we got asked to leave the studio while the musical crew recorded their jingle. At a quarter to three they had finished leaving us fifteen minutes to put it all together. Then we saw the Managers who had come to watch it- they had come early. We had virtually five minutes to complete it I don't know how we managed it! All of the groups then went into room 39 to watch the final commercial and to fill in an evaluation form of the day. I thought it was a great day; I learnt loads about business and marketing and had lots of fun. I would definitely go again if I was offered the opportunity and would recommend it to anyone.

### Yr8 Marketing trip to McDonalds

PSHE day on Monday March 15<sup>th</sup>. Twenty Gifted and Talented students visited McDonalds in Wolstanton. The manager of the establishment gave us a talk about marketing and advertising in McDonalds. The spend approximately £45 million every year on advertising. They advertise using; TV, coupons, billboards, and lots more. I learnt that it only takes 10 second to decide whether you like the product or not, or to five your message. McDonalds have 74% of the market sharing point. KFC have 12% and Subway have 6% McDonalds use loads of modern ways to promote a product, stickers , mats, offers, posters...They even use wallpaper with the name McDonalds or the letter M on to keep it fresh in your mind.

After a while we had a talk on safety in McDonalds, like wearing fluorescent

clothing when delivering take outs to customers. One student had to put on a hair net and an apron and a cap. Then someone else had to put on a rubber suit which is used when dealing with boiling hot oil. We had a tour in the kitchens where we saw how a Big Mac was made and learnt that it only took 45 seconds to cook a burger. We checked out the freezer which was kept at about -20 degrees Celsius and was very very cold. All the food gets frozen in there to keep it fresh. We went to see the drive through and saw how tightly timed the whole business is.

When we got back to school we were set a task of making an advert on healthy living. We were split up into four teams; music crew, technical crew, production crew and the editing crew. The music crew was set the task of creating a jingle for the advert we were producing, the technical crew dealt with recording the video, the production crew performed the advert and the editing crew put all the bits together and produced the final piece.

I enjoyed being in the music crew because it was very exciting and I loved thinking up new ideas. I had to sing the lyrics whilst the rest of the team created the tune. They used different instruments to create a cheesey theme and we all worked hard to get an effective result. We all enjoyed experimenting with the key boards and it was great fun coming up with the words.

A man from McDonalds and a marketing expert came in to watch



our adverts and to judge the healthy living posters made by some of the crews. I think we all enjoyed making the advert and the outcome was excellent. The judges liked it and the posters got praised. We all enjoyed the day and learnt new exciting ways to market products.

### Connexions News

Part of our role as Connexions Personal Advisers working in schools is to follow up the previous year's school leavers to find out what they are doing in terms of education, work or training by the end of the October after they have left school.

2009's destination survey gave the following information about last year's school leavers at Clayton:

89.8% continued in full-time education as opposed to 83.3% for all schools in the Newcastle district.

7.1% went into work-based training (including employed and non-employed status apprenticeships) as opposed to 11.4% for all schools in the Newcastle district.

3.1% were not yet settled as opposed to 4.3% for all schools in the Newcastle district.

0% went into jobs with no training as opposed to 0.7% for all school in the Newcastle district.

As you can see, the vast majority (almost 97%) of Clayton school leavers continued into some kind of learning post-16. This is higher than the Newcastle district's figure at 94.7% and is good news, indicating that young people at Clayton are willing to gain

further qualifications once they have left school, thus giving them a head start in the jobs market.
